

The North Central Texas Trauma Regional Advisory Council (NCTTRAC) is a Texas 501(c)3 Non-Profit Corporation established by legislative mandate. Our role is to perform as the administrative body responsible for regional trauma and emergency healthcare systems development and oversight within the bounds of Texas Trauma Service Area E (TSA-E) and healthcare coalition disaster preparedness in TSA-C, TSA-D, and TSA-E.



## EMS COUNTY ASSISTANCE

This funding is utilized to support regional initiatives such as CARES enrollment, the Texas EMS Wristband project, NCTTRAC Prehospital Transfusion Program equipment, and other EMS Committee-approved regional projects.

## PEDIATRIC READINESS TRAINING EQUIPMENT

The Pediatric Committee and REPC collaborated to purchase six pediatric Quality CPR training manikins using World Cup Preparedness funds to support Pediatric Readiness simulation training. The equipment is available for regional use.


# EXPANDING REGIONAL CONNECTIVITY WITH STARLINK

NCTTRAC has invested in Starlink satellite systems to enhance regional communication and resilience. A total of **45** Starlink units were purchased, with **22** systems deployed to Level I and Level II trauma facilities surrounding high-level FIFA World Cup 2026 venue and activity areas as an initial phase. This phased approach supports critical healthcare infrastructure while allowing for future distribution as regional needs and resources continue to evolve. The Starlink systems provide reliable, high-speed connectivity where traditional communications may be limited, helping ensure coordination and situational awareness during emergencies, deployments, and special events.



## TEXAS EMS WRISTBAND INITIATIVE

NCTTRAC advanced the implementation of Texas EMS and Triage Wristbands by distributing them to EMS agencies, FROs, and hospitals across TSA-E. These wristbands enhance patient tracking during mass-casualty events, evacuations, and disasters, and strengthen the connection between prehospital and hospital records across diverse electronic medical record systems.

# REGIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS



## EMS ACUTE STROKE ROUTING ALGORITHMS

Developed stroke routing resources tailored for urban, suburban, and rural settings, which were later endorsed statewide by GETAC to promote timely transport to appropriately capable facilities and improve patient outcomes.



## REGIONAL TRAUMA SYSTEM PLAN

Completed major revisions to meet RAC Self-Assessment requirements and incorporate new Performance Improvement initiatives, regional resources, and public education efforts.



## SYSTEM PERFORMANCE IMPROVEMENT (SPI) PLAN

Implemented a formal plan outlining the SPI efforts for the Air Medical, EMS, & Trauma Committees. This plan includes data analysis processes, defined Levels of Harm, and steps to meet established goals.



## REGIONAL FALLS PREVENTION INITIATIVE

Launched the Regional Falls Prevention Initiative in the Public Education and Injury Prevention Subcommittee that identifies areas with highest fall rates and collaborates with the EMS agencies to target fall prevention efforts and education.



## LANDING ZONE (LZ) SAFETY PRESENTATION

Developed as an on-demand training resource, later adopted statewide to support standardized education, meet new DSHS trauma rule requirements, and promote safer air medical operations.

# REGIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS



## BE-FAST HANDOUT

Created and disseminated a public education resource toolkit to enhance community awareness and response to stroke symptoms; available in English and Spanish.

## PEDIATRIC SEPSIS SCREENING TOOL

Implemented a prehospital resource to enhance early recognition of pediatric sepsis, facilitate timely hospital notification, and improve coordination of care.



## REGIONAL RESPONSE PLAN

The NCTTRAC Regional Response Plan represents a major accomplishment in regional preparedness and coordination. Developed collaboratively by healthcare, EMS, public health, and emergency management partners, the plan establishes a unified framework for medical response operations across the 19-county TSA-E region. It enhances communication, resource sharing, and situational awareness during incidents of all sizes – from local emergencies to large-scale events like the FIFA World Cup 2026. The plan reflects NCTTRAC's ongoing commitment to readiness, interoperability, and the health and safety of the community.



## MEDICAL RESPONSE & SURGE EXERCISE (MRSE)

NCTTRAC is proud to report that over **100** regional partners participated in the 2025 MRSE to successfully track over **800** patients through Pulsara. This achievement reflects the outstanding collaboration and commitment of hospitals, EMS, public health, and emergency management across the region. The exercise strengthened communication, coordination, and real-time patient tracking capabilities, further enhancing our regional readiness for real-world emergencies and major events.

### Central Texas Flood Response

On July 4th, tragedy struck Central Texas as unprecedented flooding overwhelmed the region. The Guadalupe River breached its banks, claiming the lives of 135 individuals who were celebrating the holiday weekend.

In response, EMTF-2 swiftly deployed Task Force Leadership, MIST, and ambulances to assist in rescue operations. This mission also marked the first deployment of the VIPER Trailer—VIPER (VIP for Emergency Responders) is a Mobile Medical Unit (MMU Type V/VI) designed to provide rapid medical support to responders, helping them stay engaged in the mission by offering immediate care when needed.

Recognizing the emotional toll of the disaster, TXEMTF also initiated Peer Support Teams to provide psychological and emotional support to responders throughout the operation. With two individuals still missing and the Governor committed to continuing search efforts until they are found, EMTF-2 remains actively engaged in the recovery mission, which is expected to extend well into 2026.

# KEY INITIATIVES CURRENT & FUTURE

NCTTRAC's programs and efforts cover a broad spectrum of subjects that affect the entire continuum of care throughout the emergency healthcare system. Our partners and staff work diligently to give every project the proper time and attention to ensure that the work is cohesive, thorough, and effective. Even among the multitude of programs that NCTTRAC supports each year, there are a few that stand out.

The following section describes the current state and FY26 plans for key NCTTRAC initiatives including preparing for the FIFA World Cup 2026, Pulsara and TX EMS Wristband implementation, the pre-hospital transfusion program, regional Systems Performance Improvement (SPI) and data initiatives, and the RAC Self-Assessment.

# FIFA World Cup 2026

## Health & Medical Preparedness

NCTTRAC has led a comprehensive, regionally integrated Health & Medical preparedness effort for the FIFA World Cup 2026, serving as the central convener for healthcare, public health, and emergency preparedness partners across North Texas. A formal planning and reporting structure was established with embedded subject matter experts and physician-led oversight, including eight physicians serving as City Medical Leads and Local Health Authority Leads to ensure unified clinical and public health governance. Leadership of the Health & Medical Emergency Preparedness Team is provided collaboratively by the FIFA North Texas Medical Lead, NCTTRAC, Dallas-Fort Worth Hospital Council, DSHS Public Health Region 2/3, Baylor Scott & White Health, and Texas Health Resources.

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In coordination with FIFA, NCTTRAC developed the Dallas Host City Health & Medical EPT Strategies and a standardized Hospital Preparedness Checklist now utilized by multiple Regional Advisory Councils statewide. Ten regional subject matter experts were recommended and accepted to serve on FIFA planning panels, reflecting national confidence in North Texas expertise. NCTTRAC maintains a monthly coordination cadence and provides support to partners, strengthening regional readiness and establishing a lasting preparedness legacy beyond the tournament.



## Dallas World Cup 2026 Regional Planning Hub

As Dallas prepares to welcome the world for FIFA World Cup 2026, NCTTRAC is leading coordination efforts across North Central Texas to support regional readiness. The site serves as a central resource for healthcare coalition partners, emergency planners, and public safety stakeholders involved in multi-agency preparedness and response. Stay informed on planning updates, operational guidance, and key milestones as we work together to ensure a safe and successful event.

Pulsara is the NCTTRAC regional platform for communication between EMS and hospitals for incoming patient notifications, patient tracking, and Mass Casualty Incident patient coordination.



# PREHOSPITAL TRANSFUSION PROGRAM

NCTTRAC has developed a regional SPI initiative to assist EMS agencies in establishing prehospital transfusion programs within their service areas. Eligible Department of State Health Services (DSHS) licensed EMS agencies in TSA-E may apply to become a NCTTRAC prehospital transfusion provider site. NCTTRAC is prioritizing agencies located in rural counties with the highest population for the distribution of prehospital transfusion equipment, enabling them to become provider sites upon meeting all program requirements.



## WHAT'S NEXT?

Texas legislation (Rider 35) appropriated \$10 million to establish a **Statewide Prehospital Whole Blood Pilot Program**, enabling EMS providers to administer whole blood in the field to stabilize severely bleeding patients. The program will be managed statewide by DSHS in collaboration with the Regional Advisory Councils (RACs).



All RACs are required to complete a biennial 26 indicator self-assessment, engaging committees and stakeholders to evaluate and improve emergency health care systems. **The goal is to achieve a minimum score of 3 for each indicator**; anything less requires a performance improvement action plan. **Scores of 5 are considered a best practice** and serve as a model for other RACs. The FY25 Assessment evaluated the regional EMS and Trauma system.
